

Dear Friends

As we approach Holy week we find the world troubled by war. The sadness is there is never a time we are not troubled by war. The difference is now we ourselves are being transported into the heart of the conflicts, we are shown the horrors, and we hear the testimonies of those who suffer. When, two years ago we were actively supporting Ukrainian refugees we never thought this conflict would last for this length of time. Now we watch the horrors of what is happening in Palestine, wondering when will these horrors end?

The situation in the Middle East between Israel and Palestine is a complex confrontation marked by historical, political, and religious dimensions. As Christians we must advocate for peace and diplomacy. There are Christians living within both the Israeli and the Palestinian communities. Prayer for them is the strongest weapon they can use to end the conflict. We need to join them in prayers for diplomacy, peace and ultimately reconciliation.

If I can be excused, I would like to repeat a previous Easter message.

At Easter especially we remember that there are bad, evil, cruel people in the world. That is fact. The Easter message resounds emphatically that such people in every generation do not have the last word in any story. After suffering, which was inhumane for Jesus, God emphasised that not even death could stand in the way of his love which brought the first resurrection. Since that first Easter, resurrection has been experienced many times over in many different ways. Despite all the uncertainty and anxiety of the present, our faith urges us to hold tight to the hope that in this situation in the 21st century, resurrection will result again. When and exactly how we don't yet know but it is to that hope we cling and look forward to the re-establishment of peace. Our Hallelujahs will resound again — hold onto your Easter faith: nothing can separate us from the love of God in Jesus.

Finance

The Church' financial year ended on 31 December 2023. Members of the Congregational Board and Kirk Session are Trustees of our congregation.

The Annual Report and Financial Accounts, which had nineteen pages, was emailed to Trustees who could then give approval by email. Four copies of the report were signed by our session clerk, Douglas Owens and me and then they were passed to the Examiner for approval. I am awaiting details of where to send a copy to the Accounts Inspection Committee of the Presbytery of South West Scotland. A copy went to Church of Scotland headquarters in Edinburgh. Following approval by the Accounts Inspection Committee a copy will go to the Office of the Scotlish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

From the previous year the amount given by Standing Orders and open plate increased and the amount given by Free Will Offering envelopes decreased.

We were able to claim Gift Aid refunds of £13,537 and a VAT refund of £859 under the Listed Places of Worship Scheme.

Fabric expenditure during the year was £10,617.15 for general repairs and maintenance and included £4,182 for two extra speakers in the church. Costs for heating, electricity, manse council tax, insurance and cleaning the church and halls were £17,937. Our electricity and gas is supplied by a contract which the Church of Scotland has with an energy supplier. After a three year period the previous contract ended and it changed to a new supplier on 1 October. The charges have doubled due to increases during that time.

If you are a tax payer and use a standing order or FWO envelopes or the Wee Kirks to give money to the church we could claim 25% of the amount given back from HMRC if you sign a Gift Aid Declaration form. 

Apart from the headline grabbing events in Eastern Europe and the Middle East, CA is still working in all regions of the world especially in sub-Saharan Africa. Christian Aid week this year is from the 12th to the 18th of May. Don't worry, donation envelopes will be available in plenty of time.

To enable us to replace items in our main kitchen we will be holding a donation fund raising soup lunch on the 1st Sunday of each month (September to March). Tea/coffee will be available as usual.







You will probably remember the story from 2020 about Dougald Donnely and the missing colours. For those who don't know the story, here's a brief recap.

In March 2020, just before lockdown, a social worker in Glasgow contacted me to say a colleague had died and amongst his possessions they had found our original Company Colours. These had gone missing in 1997. What became of them was a complete mystery. Dougald had been a member of 17th Ayr BB in the sixties while a resident at St. Leonards home for boys. I met Dougald when he came to the church one Friday night. He told me the happiest memories of his childhood had been in Castlehill Church Hall at the BB. Dougald, who had mental health issues, took the colours to have a reminder of the happy times of his youth. The day the social worker contacted me was the day of Dougald's funeral, I was delighted to be able to attend. I found out so much more about his life.

One year after this I was again contacted by Hugh, the social worker. After Dougald's estate had been wound up there was a few hundred pounds left. The social workers decide the money should come to the 17th Ayr BB, since we meant so much to Dougald.

We have used this money to have the Colours framed and hopefully very soon they will be adorning a public space for all to see. Thanks to Margaret Graham for organising this.





We are again going to visit our Romanian cousins this summer. Nineteen of us are travelling to Targur Mures on Sunday 28th July returning on 4th August. For the first time we are travelling from Edinburgh to Bucharest. Our costs have escalated in the two years since we last visited. We are therefore having to do some serious fundraising. There is a team of us taking part in the Kilt Walk, a 23 mile challenge from Glasgow Green to Balloch. When the Just Giving page is live we will advertise in the intimations and on the church Facebook page. The other major fundraiser we are hosting is a Race Night. This will be in Kincaidston Community Hall on Saturday 1st June. Tickets will be available @ £5

Our Anchor Section (Primary 1-3) once again attended the Ayr Battalion Anchor Boys games afternoon at the Citadel in February. The Anchor Boys have an annual colouring in competition, the prizes for which were handed out at this event, three of our boys were presented with Commended Certificates, Jax Ferguson, Nathan Bell and Max Higgins. East Ayrshire Battalion are holding a similar competition which is open to all companies in the joint Ayrshire Battalions, our boys will be entering.



Our Junior Section has been having another good session with 19 boys enrolled. We are looking forward to welcoming 2 new boys who are due to move up from Anchors after the summer. We will also be losing six boys who will be due to move up to the Company Section. Following on from our sleep over in the Main Hall last year we plan to hold another one this summer.

On May 10th we will be holding our annual display and awards for the first time since 2019. It will be a delight to have all three sections in the same space, it acts as an incentive to the younger boys when they see the older boys and what can be achieved.

As we approach Easter I remind the Boys, without the crucifixion of Jesus, the Boys' Brigade wouldn't exist. Take time to reflect on the meaning of this event and celebrate the resurrection.



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




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
