THE EASTER PROGRAMME OF SERVICES

Sunday, February 10, which is the First Sunday in Lent, will begin our services leading into the celebration of Easter. The Rev Bill Hannah will be leading all of the services over the period with appropriate themes.

The service on the Third Sunday of Lent (February 24) will be a special Youth Service when we will observe Girl Guides Thinking Day, and the theme will concentrate largely on that. However, the Boys' Brigade have accepted an invitation to support the service during which two members of the Company section will be presented with badges: Greig Paterson will receive the President's Badge and Stuart Kant the Queen's Badge. Bill Hannah writes: "I am confident that the congregation will support this service in good numbers. I look forward to welcoming the officers and members of the organisations to Church, along with the Youth Church."

Then on the Fourth Sunday of Lent, March 2 (which happens also to be Mothering Sunday) we celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Committee at 11 a.m. and 6.30 p.m.

Palm Sunday falls on March 16. Belmont Academy staff and pupils come to the Church on Maundy Thursday, March 20, for their Easter service, and in the evening we are holding a special Holy Week Service which will centre on the Sacrament of Holy Communion. That service will be conducted by the Rev Michael Dickie and the Rev Bill Hannah.

Easter Sunday will be the highlight of our celebrations. The Interim Moderator is currently thinking of how he can attract the young and old to a Sunrise (or thereabouts) service. Early warning !!! When he was minister at Muirkirk, he had the service 1900 feet up on the top of Cairntable. This one is likely to be at sea level!!!

To end the Easter celebrations, Forehill Primary School will come to Church on Wednesday, April 2 when the service will be conducted by the Rev Paul Russell who has kindly agreed to substitute for the Interim Moderator who will be on holiday.

Mr Hannah writes: "I know that many of you may be on holiday over the Easter period. Have a good break. Those who can are most welcome to bring friends to any of these services."

Too few pews ??

.....Castlehill Parish Church had a problem in 1959, only one year after the new hall-church had been erected it was bulging at the seams with members. The Church was an extension charge, promoted by the Auld Kirk of Ayr, being founded in September 1952 when Forehill farmhouse was temporarily converted into a church building. On 10 October 1956 it was decided to set up a charge, and Rev David P. Munro was inducted as minister. In 1957 the new £22,000 building was erected at the junction of Castlehill Road with Hillfoot Road. With seating to accommodate 400 worshippers, but at that time there were 418 members on the roll. However, a year later, the Church had a membership of 720 and often there was simply not enough room to accommodate them all. To solve the problem the possibility of having two morning services was considered by the minister. Also in 1959 it was proposed that the church should break its link with the Auld Kirk and seek to become a full Quoad Sacra charge.
